

COMING SOON: LATE POEMS OF LU YOU

Lu You (1125-1210) whose pen name was 'The Old Man Who Does as He Pleases,' was among the most prolific of Chinese poets, having left behind a collection of close to ten thousand poems as well as miscellaneous prose writings. His poetry, often characterized by an intense patriotism, is also notable for its recurrent expression of a carefree enjoyment of life.



In addition to poems, Burton Watson includes English translations of excerpts from Lu You's famous *Ra Draii (Diary of a Trip to Shu)*, written in 1170, which describes his experiences on a journey he took to assume the duties of vice governor in the province of Kuizhou.


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Professor Kikuko Otake was born on February 22, 1940 in Osaka, Japan. She earned her B.A. from Tsuda College of Tokyo, Japan in 1962 in English Literature. In August of 1968, she came to the US and in September 1987 earned her M.A. in Education from California State University in Los Angeles. Professor Otake is an award-winning poet who regularly publishes tanka and haiku.

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

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David Axelrod


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Dr. David B. Axelrod has published hundreds of articles and poems as well as sixteen books of poetry. Among his many grants and awards, he is recipient of three Fulbright Awards including his being the first official Fulbright Poet-in-Residence in the People's Republic of China. 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
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Jerome Rothenberg is the author of over seventy books of poetry including *Poems for the Game of Silence*, *Poland/1931*, *A Seneca Journal*, *Vienna Blood*, *That Dada Strain*, *New Selected Poems 1970-1985*, *Khurbn*, and most recently, *A Paradise of Poets* and *A Book of Witness* (all from *New Directions*). 


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Philip Terry

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Philip Terry was born in Belfast in 1962 and has been working with Oulipian and related writing practices for over twenty years. His lipogrammatic novel *The Book of Bachelors* (1999), was highly praised by the Oulipo: "Enormous rigour, great virtuosity—but that's the least of it." Currently he is Director of Creative Writing at the University of Essex, where he teaches a graduate course on the poetics of constraint. His work has been published in *Panurge*, *PN Review*, *Oasis*, *North American Review*, and *Onedit*, and his books include the celebrated anthology of short stories *Ovid Metamorphosed* (2000) and *Fables of Aesop* (2006). His translation of Raymond Queneau's last book of poems, *Elementary Morality*, is forthcoming from Carcanet. *Oulipoems* is his first book of poetry.

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
Currently serving what appears to be a life sentence at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette where he lives on three acres with a log cabin and a pond in one of the poorest parishes in the state. Fox writes poetry, prose, and short fictions as well as reviews.

He dates his birth from his first reading of Donald Allen's *The New American Poetry*, 1945-1960. He also has three chapbooks, one bibliography (on Creeley, Dorn, and Duncan), and years on *MLA Bibliography* and *Bulletin of Bibliography*.

He graduated from Bowling Green State. He has worked in woods (Pacific Northwest), warehouses (San Francisco), shake and shingle mills (Beaver, WA), lumber yards, ketchup & catfood factories, Chrysler, mental hospitals (Ohio, seven years), and so on.



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SECRET, BUT KEPT IT ROOM

Explores the development and stasis over time of self as image—at once real and artificial, subjective and perspectival, engaged in the physical world and torn from it, a self often disappearing into non-self. 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
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
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
Yoko Danno
